

# Eynsham Mill Circular Walk



TL turn left  
TR turn right

BR bear right


A 3 mile circular walk, starting from Mill Street, moving anticlockwise to include the old Cassington Road and the picturesque grounds of Eynsham Mill, returning via Eynsham's Millennium Wood and the Evenlode pub. Mill Street is so called because it extended north to Eynsham Mill, site of

the original abbey mill, on the River Evenlode, for which the rent was paid partially in eels. Paper making here started in 1682 for book production, supplying the fine paper for bible printing in Oxford. Cassington Road is rich in roadside and hedgerow plants, with hawthorn, elder, crab apples and hops

in abundance. The riverside stretch may offer a kingfisher sighting; roe deer are often seen in the fields; and the Millennium Wood has all the blackberries and sloes you could wish for in autumn, along with the unfeasible pink of spindleberries and the promise of cob nuts to come.
